When was the last time you sat down and performed a thorough preflight on your glider? If you own a HLG I'll bet you haven't even looked inside the fuselage for months, except to hookup the battery for charging or flying. What about the last time you checked the Center-of-Gravily? Do you think everything is secured so well in the fuselage that nothing has broken-loose during those nose-dive spot landings?

If there is one constant in the world, it is that nothing is constant. Change is bound to happen, batteries shift position, receivers move, wires pull or chaff, and structures weaken and facture. If detected before you push the flight envelope, you might save yourself some money, some repair time, or physical damage to someone or something else. How many times have you walked up to the contest winch and heard the guy behind you in line say,"this is the first flight since I repaired his ship"? What does this say about his concern for others? What does it say about you if you don't tell him how dangerous he's actions are or report his actions to the Contest Director? You know, I've been scolded a few times for flying close to vehicles or other planes, and I deserved to be reminded in those cases. But I have seen the same pilots that scold, are offenders of the same actions themselves. So are they concerned for others safety, or only admonishing a fellow pilot in public? Safety

should always be our priority; our top concern for our friends; their health, their ability to fly; their ability to operate safely around others. We have been very lucky in this sport. I have seen many things go wrong that could have had a different outcome.

Let's take a moment to think about the trends we witness and what we can do to insure that we don't add to the statistics.

The biggest danger (and it happens regularly), is an aircraft spinning/diving toward the ground out-of-control. Causes of this "loss of control" varying from structural failure to frequency jamming or battery exhaustion. Can these be prevented? You bet they can! Turn your receiver on first and watch for reception of signals on your frequency. Always insure you have the frequency pin, and know who else is on your channel (and watch them). Did you do a post-flight inspection after those hard landings? Did you do a pre-flight inspection as you prepared to fly? Look at the interior and exterior structure; twist, tap, and bend to reveal any cracks or broken connections. Look at those wires; even the ones under the foam and buried in the nose. Is the Battery secure? The battery wires unstrained and connected? Is your nose ballast secure and not making electrical contact with the battery? Could you lose the battery on launch or hard aerobatics? Have you cycled your battery lately to determine how long it will hold a charge? Is the battery dated so that you know when it is lime to replace it? (A \$20 battery can save a lot of airplane repairs and medical bills.)

People succeed at being safe because they build good habits. Good habits for safety take TIMF and COMMITMENT. If you can't be bothered, then you are unsafe. If you act safely, your fellow pilots may not say thank—you; BUT they won't be telling stories about YOU at the next field meet, or hiding behind their cars when you fly! Please take the time to be committed to Safety First.

WHAT'S ON THE NEWS ON RC SOARING EXCHANGE (RCSE)?

From Don Stackhouse (Designer of DJ Aerotech fame)

Regarding the current thread about reinforcing fuselages and other structures with nylon stockings, I'd like to add some relevant into on composite structure design. I will cover several subjects, but I promise to eventually end up back on the original subject of nylon/epoxy reinforced fuselages.

A composite structure is a mixture of materials, typically a matrix and a fiber of some sort. In general, the fiber is some strong material which is there to carry the loads, and the matrix is there to hold the fibers in position.

It is very important that the stiffnesses and strengths of the components be properly matched. The stiffness of the fiber should be substantially higher than the matrix, and the "strain to failure" (how far you can stretch it before it breaks, usually specified in inches per inch of original size, or in %) of the matrix should be higher than the fiber's. An example of this would be concrete reinforced with steel. Concrete by itself has good compressive strength, but low tensile strength. By adding steel rods, mesh, etc., the steel can carry the tensile loads. Since the steel is stiffer than the concrete, as you stretch the structure the steel picks up most of the load.

Consider now the case of concrete reinforced with rubber rods. As you stretch this structure the stiffer concrete picks up the loads much faster than the rubber, and in fact the concrete will have long since broken and crumbled away (because its strain to failure is much less than the rubber) before the rubber has stretched far enough to carry hardly any of the load. While the rubber may in fact be capable of supporting the required load, it contributed almost nothing to the strength of the original structure. The structure would have been stronger if you had used the space occupied by the rubber to add more
