This Month's Safety First Column combines the subjects of etiquette and safety. These may not appear to be related, but make no mistake about it, safety and etiquette go hand-in-hand.

Ever wonder why the same guys usually win at each contest? Because they PRACTICE! They practice every time they step up to the winch. The pilots that win come out almost every weekend, constantly tuning their sailplanes and most importantly, practicing landings. Do you know how hard it is to concentrate on those "100" pointers when there are three guys standing in front of the tape? When you launch your airplane, fly away from the launch zone and move away from the winch. Be aware of the landing zone and give landing aircraft the right of way. Don't, repeat DON'T fly over the winch line. You are not only endangering your aircraft, but you could bring down the guy who just launched if you snag the line. Everyone occasionally gets into trouble and may have to cross the line to get back to the field; but make it the exception, not the rule.

Want to get chased off the field faster than Don Cleveland can eat a bucket of chicken? (ED: Author's personal observation and opinion only! I saw Don take all day to consume a whole bucket by himself!) Fly erratically or low over parked cars and airplanes. If you have a insatiable desire to destroy something, please make it your own stuff. Try to pile your airplane into the middle of the field, not through the root of you buddy's new van. Remember, the "C" in R/C Soaring stands for Control.

What do you think your friend would say if he handed you the transmitter to let you fly his new "super X Thermal Killer" and you worked the sticks with your feet? You wouldn't think of doing this would you? But people routinely operate retrievers by stepping on the switch. This

stuff is expensive. When the switches break, someone has to buy and replace them. Use your finger, not your foot. Enuff said.

Even under the best conditions, winches occasionally act up. It's the nature of the beast. Lines break or backlash, drum brakes screw up, swivels stop rotating, etc. If you're not sure how to fix such problems, get a more experienced club member to help. This is one of those deals where there is no strength in numbers. One guy with experience will get you up and running in minutes, while a repair committee might take half an hour. Everyone comes to the field to fly, right? So let the experienced guys fix things tast. By watching and asking questions you too can soon be one of those "experts" and can spend the day fixing stuff instead of flying.

One last etiquette item. If you get to the field late and all the equipment is set up, look for the turn-a-round and winch lines in the grass BEFORE driving onto the field. Running over the lines or turn-a-round could ruin everybody's day!

Concerning safety; you know that simple motor thing that pulls your plane into the air? Treat it with the same respect you give to a screaming chain saw. The winch line can and will cut through pants, legs, arms or just about anything that it touches in less than a second. Don't stand directly behind the winch. A breaking 200 lb test line has a lot of stored energy.

Our batteries are another device that requires our respect. Batteries are a nasty concoction of lead and sulfuric acid. The acid will burn your skin, not to mention ventilate your shoes or clothing. Use caution to avoid direct contact. Charging batteries also offers a reasonable amount of danger. While being charged, batteries give off hydrogen gas which is very explosive (remember the Hindenburg?). If you are working in the battery shed, do not connect or disconnect the charger clips while the charger is ON. The resulting spark could cause an explosion! I Don't want to scare anyone out of this sport. This soaring stuff is fairly safe. Just use a little common sense; help as much as you can; and most importantly, have fun!

Happy Thermals, and remember: "SAFETY FIRST".

Tech-Tips

RADIO EQUIPMENT COMPATIBILITY

Wondering if you can mix radio control equipment from different manufacturers? Here is a small list of DO's and DON'Ts that might save some grief:

- Avoid mixing txer and rxer brands or types. You can't mix AM with FM and FM with PCM. After-market rxers are OK, but any other mix is an experiment. Get Advice!
- If you mix FM airborne equipment, ensure that the negative (black or brown) lead on the battery and servos are inserted on the same side as the original manufacturer's equipment (Usually the outside edge of the rxer, ex-
- cept on Airtronics.) Futaba and HiTec RCD use a negative shift signal, while Airtronics and JR use a positive shift signal.
- Never use a JR Txer charger to charge a HiTec RCD Txer or vice versa. They look the same, but are reversed polarity.
- Never use a HiTec RCD crystal in any other brand of radio. Their crystal is actually a tuning circuit and is in no way similar to other common crystals.
- Make no assumptions when substituting different brands of equipment. Call the manufacturer or HiTec.


